

ON THE WAY.....



May the grace and peace of the Holy Spirit be with us forever.


Advent is a special time in the Church's year. The tug of Christmas is so strong that we can tend to skip right over Advent and start celebrating Christmas early. But Advent should have a special place in our prayer. According to the Universal Norms: "Advent has a twofold character, for it is a time of preparation for the Solemnities of Christmas, in which the First Coming of the Son of God to humanity is remembered, and likewise a time when, by remembrance of this, minds and hearts are led to look forward to Christ's Second Coming at the end of time. For these two reasons, Advent is a period of devout and expectant delight." Notice how the prayers during the Mass reflect both aspects of the Advent season. The Scripture readings of the season also reflect this twofold character – readings at the beginning of the season accenting the Second Coming and as we move closer to Christmas the "expectant delight" of Christmas becomes highlighted.

During the times we are living through we must confront the human condition which always includes suffering. A romantic look back at the Christmas story can mask the suffering that was woven into the experience of Jesus and Mary. They faced scandal and misunderstanding from family members and friends. They were displaced from the homes by arbitrary government policies. They had to endure homelessness and inadequate shelter just when they needed security the most. They had the experience of exile, living as strangers in a strange land. They were immigrants, no doubt part of a "caravan" seeking a place where they would not be in danger. All the troubles in our society were reflected in theirs. The season invites us to trust as they did in the providential care of God toward us no matter what we are going through.

We mark the Advent season with a four candle wreath – one for each week. The color of the season is purple – but on the blue-violet end of the spectrum. Advent is one season where the sense of smell can be an important part of our environment. Using real evergreens and flowers can help us get into the spirit of the season by grounding us in the sensual experience of God's presence in creation.

Just a quick word about the Feast of the Immaculate Conception that we celebrated yesterday. This is the patronal feast day of the United States of America. In May 17, 1846, the bishops of the United States proclaimed Mary, under the title of her Immaculate Conception, the principal patroness of the whole country. This is interesting because the solemn declaration of the doctrine of Mary's Immaculate Conception was not pronounced by

Pope Pius IX until 1854! The Holy Father declared: "That the most Blessed Virgin Mary, in the first instance of her conception, by a singular grace and privilege granted by Almighty God, in view of the merits of Jesus Christ, the Savior of the human race, was preserved free from all stain of original sin." The US Bishops anticipated this Pontifical declaration, and this was among the reasons that Pope Pius acted when he did. "Oh Mary, conceived without sin. Pray for us who have recourse to thee."
