FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK

ADVENT COMING ON

If Advent is the season of the preparation for Christmas, then for shoppers it began around Halloween, when the tinsel and trees and gift wrap began to appear in most of the stores. In that world of



commerce, Christmas preparation pretty much comes down to buying presents, and really doesn't involve anything more challenging than trying to find an appropriate gift for each person on the list. This may keep us busy for a month or two, but it doesn't seem to take us very deep. There is not much mystery to the department store holiday.

We would like to think that we're about more serious business than that, even if we can't keep clear of the shopping fever all together. Our Advent season begins much later, less than a month before Christmas, and it blows by us so fast that we have to run just to keep up with it. We hear the voice of the prophets, we see John the Baptist cry out his message Prepare the way of the Lord, and we hurry with Mary to the hill country of Judea to visit her kinswoman Elizabeth. Things move so quickly it is all a blur, and before we know it we are standing near the crib, gazing at the newborn Savior of the world. And it is only then, if then, that we can pause to catch our breath and ask ourselves if this is all there is, if all this effort has gone into a kind of mental "what if" exercise in which we try imagine what it might have been like to have been in Bethlehem to greet Christ's birth as it was happening.

To read the Fathers of the Church on all this is to enter a very different world. Without having us ignore the birth in Bethlehem, St. Leo and St. Augustine would quietly and relentlessly insist that the coming of the Lord we are preparing for is not his birth in the flesh, which for them was already long ago and for us is even longer ago. They would have us keep one eye on the babe, while with the other eye we scan the horizon for signs of another coming of Christ, his second coming, the Advent of Christ when he comes in all his glory. This year's gospel reading for the first Sunday of Advent also directs our attention to the future, to what we have not yet received rather than to that which is already a part of our history and our memory.

Memory is important, and it is always good for us to remember and give thanks for what we have already received, including and above all the appearance of the Lord in our human nature. But anticipation and hope are also important and not to be forgotten in this holy season, when we remind ourselves that we have been promised even greater blessings than those we have already received. As the Church Fathers pointed out again and again, Christ became what we are so that we might become what he is; the Son of God became Son of Man so that the sons and daughters of men might become the very sons and daughters of the living God; the eternal Word became flesh so that we who are flesh and blood might become divine. The glory of the fulfillment of that promise of union is what we await, and it is really what we are preparing for, not just in these few weeks of a very short Advent season but throughout our lives, as we grow in the grace of hope, the grace of longing for that which has not yet come upon us, but which we know is on the way.


mention this at Sunday Mass, please make allowance for poor memory and call the parish offices.

Campus Ministry Highlights for Fall 2015

Campus ministry is a huge commitment on the part of this parish. But it should not be a surprise that St. James would take on such a commitment; this is a parish that always looks beyond her own members to realize her mission. Saint James Church is always here to serve!

Like the parish, campus ministry has an apostolic spirit, reaching beyond the registered members. Yes, there are retreats, meetings, Masses, and prayer services designed to meet the needs of our CCM student organization members. Just as importantly, campus ministry partners with other organizations and casual groups of students to remind them that the Church is here and the Church loves and cares for them. Several of our tutors at De LaSalle Institute and our student volunteers for the food pantry are not Catholic. We partner with ROTC and the Athletic Teams to collect items for the food pantry. Our Brazilian and Indian parties attract in more than "the usual suspects." Here are some highlights of events so far this semester:

Spirituality: 4:00 p.m. Sunday Mass on campus; Wednesday evening prayer on campus; Men's spirituality group meeting twice a month; Hosting of our parish and student fall day of reflection; Fall Camping Retreat Helping with our children's Sunday School.

Education: Tutors at De LaSalle Institute (including one parishioner!); Class on Pope Francis' letter on the environment; Information tables on campus during move-in and orientation; Alumni-sponsored vocation talk at homecoming dinner.

Campus Life: Brazilian procession and party for the Patroness of Brazil, Pantry Drives by women's volleyball, women's soccer, swim & diving, and men's soccer.
