

## FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK

## LISTENING TO JESUS

Last week's mass had us with Christ in the desert, tempted by the devil. This week's mass brings us with Peter, James, and John to the mountain top to see Jesus transfigured, his glory shining forth and born witness to not only by Moses and Elijah, but also by the voice that speaks from the cloud. Clearly, this is something we need to see, but it is also something that we need to understand well... or, at least

better than Peter first understands it.



The glory of the mountain is the glory of the Kingdom of God. In the verse just before this moment, Jesus had uttered a prophecy to his disciples: "Amen I say to you, there are some standing here who will not taste death before they see the Kingdom of God." Eight days later comes the fulfillment of this prophecy as Jesus

takes his favorite three disciples to the mountain top and gives them a glimpse of the glory of the Kingdom shining through him. This is what all of Israel had been waiting and longing for all of its history, and so Moses and Elijah, the law and the prophets, are there to give testimony by their presence that this is indeed the fulfillment not just of Jesus' prophecy of eight days earlier, but of all that Israel had been created to receive.

This glimpse of the Kingdom's final glory comes with a teaching on how that glory will be achieved. Moses and Elijah are not silent figures here. They discuss with Jesus his "exodus," his departure which he was about to accomplish in Jerusalem. In other words, they are talking about his passion and death, for as Jesus had already taught his disciples, the only way into the heart of God's Kingdom is the way of the cross, the way of suffering that he would first walk and that they would then walk along with him.

This is the teaching that Peter and the others – and ourselves, too, often enough – do not want to hear and refuse to understand. Peter is overcome with the glory of this moment and his first instinct is to hang on to it, to preserve it forever and cancel out all those future moments that Jesus' words have seemed to fill with warning and pain. He wants to build three tents or booths, three dwelling places so that they can all remain right where they are, surrounded by the glory of the Kingdom that is to come. But this cannot be. There is no glory without the cross, and the way of the cross is the only way into the Kingdom for Jesus and for his followers. And so the voice of the Father rumbles out of the cloud: "This is my Beloved Son; listen to him!" The Father chides the disciples for not doing what they must do: Listen to Jesus. He speaks of his own way, the way of rejection and condemnation and a shameful death, and the disciples don't want to hear of it. They want a short and easy way into the Kingdom, they want the glory without the cross, they want an Easter that never had a Good Friday before it.

And this cannot be, not for Jesus nor for them. They, and we, must listen to all that Jesus says, so that we can accompany him in his passion and so enter with him into the glory of God's love. That is really what Jesus offers us. It is all that he has to offer us, and in this Lenten season we try to listen and to grasp hold of what he gives. He offers us himself and invites us to share in all that he is and experiences. His cross and tomb become our own, and thus we have our door, the only door, into the Kingdom.

## Meet Fr. John Edmunds, S.T.



What a joy to be invited to serve St. James as your pastor. I look forward to many years sharing life with this community. My prayer is that together we will be able to walk in the presence of God and share the Good News with others. I look forward to getting to know you, so let me introduce myself.

I was born and raised in Baltimore, Maryland, the oldest of the six children of John and Theresa Edmunds. My mother was the child of Polish immigrants and was bi-lingual in Polish. My grandparents were immigrants to this country who never learned English... And I, unfortunately, never learned Polish. My father's maternal grandparents were German immigrants. The Edmunds side has been in the United States since the seventeenth century.

The idea of serving as a priest and a missionary was a boyhood dream. I entered a high school seminary and spent the next thirteen years in various schools and programs to prepare for life as a religious and a priest. I took my first vows as a Missionary Servant of the Most Holy Trinity in 1970 and I was ordained to the priesthood on May 15, 1976. It seems like yesterday.

Since ordination I have worked in California, Chicago (one year, during the Mayor Bilandic snow storm!), Louisiana, Alabama, Maryland, New Jersey and Virginia. My ministries have included parish work, youth work, community development, vocation work, campus ministry (at Louisiana State University and the University of Maryland), formation work, and in leadership of my religious community. I served for several years on the National Board of the Conference of Major Superiors of Men, including one term as president. In that role I had the great privilege of having a private audience with Pope Francis. Since that meeting, I consider the Holy Father my BFF.

My undergraduate degree (in philosophy) was from The Catholic University of American in Washington, D.C. I obtained an M.A. in systematic theology from the Washington Theological Union and a Licentiate in Sacred Theology (S.T.L.) from CUA with an emphasis in Spiritual Theology. At the Aquinas Institute in St. Louis I earned a Doctorate of Ministry (D.Min.) in Preaching. You'll have to tell me if I deserve the degree!

Most of my ministries over the years have been among the African-American community. Before my time in leadership for my congregation, I spent seventeen years as pastor of an inner city parish in Jersey City, New Jersey. The rich diversity at St. James is a great gift that you can be justly proud of, and I look forward to getting to know you.

Your logo of the scallop shell caught my eye. As you no doubt know, the scallop is the symbol of those on pilgrimage (the Camino) to the Shrine of St. James as Santiago de Compostela. I walked the Camino in 2003 all the way from St. Jean Pied de Port in France to the Shrine – five hundred plus miles over thirty days. I felt an immediate connection to St. James when I saw your logo. It seems like providence has brought us together. Let us pray that we will walk in faith together into the future God has in store for us.
