

ON THE WAY....

AT ST. JAMES



Welcome to African-American Heritage Sunday at St. James. This festivity provides an opportunity to express gratitude for the elders upon whose shoulders we stand today. We can also reflect on the larger role that

African-Americans have played in the life of the

Catholic Church in the United States. I highly recommend The History of Black Catholics in the United States by Cyprian Davis, OSB, a monk from St. Meinrad's Archabbey who died in 2015. Fr. Davis sketches out the triumph and the tragedy of Black Catholic history that has been "lost, stolen or strayed."

The obvious fact is that Black Catholics are a minority in a minority. The best current estimate is that there are approximately 2 million Black Catholics in the US – about two and one-half percent of the total Catholic population. (If you count recent immigrants to the US from Africa and the Caribbean the numbers are higher.) While 2 million might seem small compared with the 66 million Catholics it is more than the TOTAL number of Jehovah's Witnesses, Seventh Day Adventists and members of the Church of God.

The Civil Rights movement in the United States prompted a re-thinking of the role that African-American Catholics should play in the US. Leaders like Archbishop James Lyke, OFM; Sister Thea Bowman, OFPA, and Brother (later Father) Joseph Davis, SM, articulated the desire to be both authentically Catholic and authentically Black. They realized that much of the cultural baggage of the Church was European, not specifically Catholic. Institutions such as the Black Catholic Clergy Caucus, the Institute for Black Catholic Studies at Xavier University in New Orleans and Augustus Tolten Pastoral Ministry Program at CTU have over the years been able to point out a way forward for Black Catholics.

In 1984 the African-American bishops in the US issued a pastoral letter entitled What We Have Heard and Seen. In the letter they describe some of the characteristics of Black Spirituality. It is 1) contemplative, that is aware of God's presence permeating existence; 2) wholistic, including body and soul, mind and emotion, action and contemplation, individual and community, the sacred and the secular; 3) joy-filled, celebrative in rhythm and song, color and sensation, movement and feeling; and 4) communitarian, worshipping in a way that spills out in social justice. We at St. James try to embody that spirituality every day.

Let me end by quoting from St. Pope John Paul II who addressed the Black Catholic leadership in New Orleans in 1987. "Your black cultural heritage enriches the Church and makes her witness of universality more complete. In a real way, the Church needs you just as you need the Church, for you are part of the Church and the Church is part of you... I express my deep love and esteem for the black Catholic community in the United States. Its vitality is a sign of hope for society. Composed as you are of many lifelong Catholics, and many who have more recently embraced the faith, together with a growing immigrant community, you reflect the Church's ability to bring together a diversity of people united in faith, hope and love, sharing a communion with Christ in the Holy Spirit."
