

JULY 1, 2018 13TH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

ON THE WAY....



May the grace and peace of the Holy Spirit be with us forever.

Our nation approaches its 242 birthday in a ball of confusion. The recent government practice of separating children from their parents who have come to our border appealing for asylum has epitomized the deep divisions about the nature and role of government's intervention into our lives. Of course, Christians cannot limit our evaluation of the right thing to do according to political expediency or even personal preference. We rely on Biblical values and Church teaching to help form our consciences and determine how we should be involved in the political process. Nor can we cherry pick a biblical text to justify the position we have already taken. We must use our entire religious tradition to shape the decisions we make and not simply find a "proof text" for what we already are determined to do.

Immigration has become a divisive issue in the United States. Everyone's story has, no doubt, shaped the opinion one has about the best approach to immigration. Let me confess up front that my story makes me believe that policies that welcome immigrants who wish to be productive members of US society will strengthen, not weaken our nation. My grandparents arrived in Baltimore on the S.S. Necker in October, 1912 after fleeing their native Poland. Austria had occupied the area where they lived and my grandfather did not want to become swept in in Austrian war plans. Happily at that point in US history immigrants were valued for the contribution they could make to our country. That faith has been rewarded since the children, grandchildren, great-grandchildren and now great-great grandchildren of these immigrants are productive Americans.

Christians add to their personal experience the faith dimension. We look, for example, at lessons from the Bible. Leviticus 19:34b says, "You shall love the alien as yourself, for you were aliens in the land of Egypt." In other words, Israel should remember that they once were



"strangers in a strange land" who knew what it was like to be ill-treated as foreigners. Or think of Joseph and Mary taking the Baby Jesus with them as refugees into Egypt. The political system in the homeland was dangerous for them so they crossed the border into a neighboring country. Happily for them, there was no separation of parents and children at that border. Again, as Jesus describes the last judgment in the Parable of the Sheep and the Goats we welcome Jesus when we take in the stranger. In the teaching of the Church since everyone is a child of God, made in God's image and likeness, everyone must be treated with dignity and respect, regardless of race or national origin.

The political calculus of the moment is how to balance these ideals with the need of the United States to maintain its own territorial integrity. As we celebrate our country's birth on the Fourth of July, let us be motivated by the same spirit which lead to the founding of this country. Our national origins are not about geography but about carving out a space where the Creator-endowed inalienable rights to "life, liberty, and the pursuit of happiness" are available to all.
