




ON THE WAY....



May the grace and peace of the Holy Spirit be with us forever.

A few weeks ago I mentioned the recent apostolic exhortation of Pope Francis entitled Gaudete et Exultate. When you google it you can find the text on the Vatican website. Recently a group of priests and brothers spent a week of retreat reflecting on the document. I found the experience to be very rewarding so over the next few weeks I would like to share those reflections with you. The letter is divided into five parts so this week's reflection will be on Part I: "The Call to Holiness."

The Holy Father picks up a theme from Vatican Council II that there is "a universal call to holiness." Holiness, sanctity, is not something reserved for a special class of people - the monks or the nuns - but is meant of every Christian. One author put it this way: "The only great tragedy in life is not to become a saint." That is not the way we ordinarily think. We strive to be decent thinking that being a saint is beyond us. The Holy Father says we are mistaken because we have a false image of what sanctity looks like. We imagine it with incense and chants. But Pope Francis sees sanctity as involving loads of laundry and going to work each day. He calls it "the middle class of holiness.



ON THE CALL TO HOLINESS IN THE CONTEMPORARY WORLD

Although he does not quote from Saint Francis De Sales directly ideas similar to his can be found in An Introduction to the Devout Life. Both the Saint and the Pope insist that sanctity is found according the circumstances of one's existence, not on some lofty plain. Pope Francis puts it this way: "We are all called to be holy by living lives with love and by bearing witness in everything we do, wherever we find ourselves" [#14]. For example, the Holy Father says that we become saints at our jobs when we work "with integrity and skill in the service of our brothers and sisters." That sounds doable. Pope Francis reminds us that for most of the life of Jesus that was exactly what he did – lived out his holiness by going to work in the carpenter's shop of Saint Joseph.

One major theme the Holy Father proposes is that holiness by its very nature involves sharing life with others. "It has pleased God to make men and women holy and to save them, not as individuals without any bond between them, but rather as a people' [#6]. Since God is a community of persons as the Trinity we are meant to find our holiness in the "complex fabric of interpersonal relationships present in the human community." Thus even our time of quiet, personal prayer in the presence of God is not an end in itself but one side of the same coin which includes how we relate to others. That is why Jesus included in the great Commandment love of God and love of neighbor. Therefore, Pope Francis concludes, "We need a spirit of holiness capable of filling both our solitude and our service... In this way, every minute of our lives can be a step along the path to growth in holiness" [#31].


