

DECEMBER 2, 2018 1st SUNDAY OF ADVENT

ON THE WAY.....



May the grace and peace of the Holy Spirit be with us forever.

The beginning of the Church's Liturgical Year, the First Sunday of Advent, coincides with the parish celebration of St. Francis Xavier, copatron (with St. Therese of Lisieux) of the missions. This provides a providential opportunity for us to reflect on the role that during this new year (and for every year hereafter!) each one of us is called to become missionaries in our everyday life.

Francis Xavier (born in 1506 as Francisco de Jasso y Azpilicueta -Javier was his hometown) was part of the privileged nobility in the kingdom of Navarre in present day Spain. At age 19, Francis went to study at the University of Paris. In 1529, Francis shared lodgings with his friend Pierre Favre when a new student, Ignatius of Loyola, came to room with them. At 38, Ignatius was much older than Pierre and Francis, who were both 23 at the time. Ignatius convinced Pierre to become a priest, but was unable to convince Francis, who had aspirations of worldly advancement. At first Francis regarded the new lodger as a joke and was sarcastic about his efforts to convert students. When Pierre left their lodgings to visit his family and Ignatius was alone with Francis, he was able to slowly break down Francis's resistance. In 1530 Francis received his degree and began teaching philosophy. Ignatius gathered other companions around him, Francis Xavier and Peter Favre and in 1534 seven of them took private vows. This is the beginning of the Jesuits. Francis began his study of theology and was ordained a priest on 24 June 1537.

At a request from the king of Portugal Ignatius sent the first Jesuit missionaries to India - Xavier among them. Francis's primary mission, as ordered by King John III, was to restore Christianity among the Portuguese settlers in Goa. Xavier decided that he must begin by instructing the Portuguese and gave much of his time to the teaching of children. He devoted almost three years to the work of preaching to the people of southern India and Ceylon (Sri Lanka), converting many. He built nearly 40 churches along the coast.

Xavier then moved to other Portuguese colonies in southeast Asia for another three years. Upon meeting traders from other areas he desired to spread the faith into areas where the Church did not yet exist. He was the first Christian missionary to venture into Japan, Borneo, the Maluku Islands, and other areas. In those areas, struggling to learn the local languages and in the face of opposition, he had less success than he had enjoyed in India. Xavier was about to extend his missionary preaching to China when he died on Shangchuan Island never having seen Ignatius again. He is considered to be one of the greatest missionaries since Saint Paul.

Saint Francis Xavier reminds us that the faith is not a rock to be clutched to one's bosom and kept safe. Rather, it is meant to be shared, to be spread. We are probably not called as Xavier was to go into exotic lands to preach. But among our family, friends and neighbors we must convey what a precious gift we have in having Jesus as part of our lives.


