

## ON THE WAY.....

May the grace and peace of the Holy Spirit be with us forever.

One of the experiments after Vatican II was the dialogue homily. Instead of a preparing a sermon, the would invite preacher the congregation to share its reflection on the readings for that Sunday. On one memorable Feast of Christ the King in



the seminary the presider, a long time professor of philosophy, invited us to reflect on the Feast. One of the students suggested that calling Christ a "King" did not resonate well with people in the United States. We had, after all, fought to eliminate a king from ruling over us. For him, the word king had negative connotations. To which the priest in shocked amazement replied, "But Brother, it's an analogous predication," Needless to say, that shut down any further dialogue about the Feast!

While you can understand the student's point of view, royalty is not that foreign to Americans. After all, wasn't Aretha Franklin the Queen of Soul! And whenever one of the British royal family gets married or has a child the media goes into a frenzy. With that background what does a contemporary understanding of kingship say to us about the title of "Christ the King?"

The gospels relate that there were times when Jesus' followers did want to proclaim him as king. He always fled from those situations. He in no way wanted to be associated with kings who ruled over others or who were more important than others. It was not until he was facing his death that he dealt with the guestion of being a king. At the trial before Pilate he responds to the question about kingship by saying "My kingdom does not belong to this world." Instead of being called a king in this world he would rather be known as the one who "testifies to the truth" (John 18:33-37). Pilate, of course, did not understand what Jesus was talking about and so accused him in the language he did understand - power politics. The indictment on Calvary's hill was "Jesus of Nazareth, the King of the Jews."

Jesus wants us to understand him as a king in terms of the truth. We live in an age where the truth seems to be up for grabs. Politicians manipulate the truth, or worse completely ignore it, in order to impose their own agenda. We who are followers of Jesus, however, don't have the luxury of playing with the truth. Christ, our King, has made the truth the hall marks of his kingdom. So what are some of the truths that the subjects of Christ the King must acknowledge? First, that God loves us first, last and always. The love God has for us is not contingent on our behavior but given as a free gift unasked and unearned. Second, because the love of God has been poured into our hearts there isn't anyone out there who isn't a child of God. Race, nationality, gender do not define us – everyone has a claim on us because we share a family resemblance with God. Third, whatever we do for the least, that we are doing for Jesus. Our lives as followers of Jesus enmeshes us in the lives of all God's children. We live the truth of the Feast of Christ the King in our relationships of love and service.
