

JANUARY 6, 2019 THE EPHIPANY OF THE LORD

ON THE WAY.....



May the grace and peace of the Holy Spirit be with us forever.

Did you make any New Year's Resolutions? Have you been able to keep them for the first six days of this new year? If you are anything like me ... sorta, kinda. That losing weight thing and regular exercise are great ideas but we (or at least I) quickly fall into old patterns. One resolution I do hope to keep this year is to become a bridge when there are differences. The polarized political scene has divided society into "us" and "them." What can I do to create a sense of oneness even when there are profound differences about the choices confronting us? In the Church people find themselves in liberal or conservative camps, liking or not liking Pope Francis. How can I help people to disagree without being disagreeable?

This is not just a good idea but a gospel imperative. Again and again in the scripture – think of St. Paul's hymn to charity in 1 Corinthians 13 or Jesus Prayer for unity in John 17 – you find the reminder that what unites us is more important than any differences we might have. We are all the children of God. There isn't anyone out there who isn't made in God's image and likeness. I hope to make this year a time when I can become a "channel of Christ's peace."

Today is, of course, the celebration of the Feast of the Epiphany. St. Matthew tells this story of the "visitors from the East" to highlight the fact that right from the beginning of the life of Jesus "all are welcome" to follow him. This is a feast of inclusion, of invitation to all and sundry. Let us recommit ourselves at St. James to make sure that we treat each other with kindness and forgiveness and convey a sense of welcome to those enter our doors.

Of course creating a peaceful environment and a spirit of welcome begins, not in Church, but in the home. The people that we love the most are the ones capable of giving us the greatest joy but also of inflicting the greatest wounds. We must begin our resolve for greater unity and love right in our home and it will then radiate out into the larger world. In my Polish family this is the day when we would bless our home and commit ourselves to being hospitable by inscribing the numerals of the new year over the door to the house along with the cross of Christ and the initials of the traditional names of the Magi: Kaspar, Melchior and Balthasar. It would look like this:

20 + K + M + B + 19.

If you would like to do something similar take a piece of chalk and the blessing prayer provided in the vestibule of the Church and bless your home. Then each time you go through the door you will be reminded of the blessing of God that offers you and your family grace and protection. Every

blessing to you in 2019.

20 + C + M + B + is 25
