

## ON THE WAY.....



May the grace and peace of the Holy Spirit be with us forever.

There was a time when something called "Catholic culture" permeated society. Religious holidays were, well, religious and they determined the rhythm of people's lives. Nowadays things are different. Either the holidays are moved to be more convenient (Epiphany was traditionally on January 6 and is now on a Sunday. Ascension Thursday is celebrated on Sunday as well.) Or what had once been a religious holiday has been co-opted by society. (Christmas being the most obvious example. Mardi Gras and St. Patrick's days are excuses to party.) Our sense of important holidays are given to us by secular culture more than by the liturgical calendar. Last year, for example, more people were at mass on Thanksgiving Day (a national celebration) than on the Feast of the Immaculate Conception (a holy day of obligation and the patronal saint of the United States.)

While something is lost with the demise of Catholic culture we should not be nostalgic for the "good old days." It has been the constant tradition of the Church going back to the very beginnings to "baptize" secular celebrations and transform them into something religious. Take Christmas, for example. In ancient Rome there was a celebration around the time of the winter solstice. Juvenalia was a feast honoring the children of Rome. The entire season was called Dies Natalis Invicti Solis, the Birthday of the Unconquered Sun. The festival season was marked by much merrymaking. It is also in ancient Rome that groups of costumed singers and dancers, called the Mummers, traveled from house to house during the season to entertain their neighbors. From this came the tradition of Christmas caroling. Since no one knew the date of Jesus' birth the Church took this pagan celebration and gave it religious significance.

Which serves as an introduction to Mothers' Day -- even this secular holiday has been co-opted by the society. Anna Jarvis held a memorial for her mother who had been a peace activist who cared for wounded soldiers on both sides of the American Civil War and created Mother's Day Work Clubs to address public health issues. Anna Jarvis wanted to honor her mother by continuing the work she started and to set aside a day to honor all mothers because she believed a mother is "the person who has done more for you than anyone in the world." Of course, the commercial interests have taken over and there is little or no thought of the public good which were the roots of the celebration of Mothers' Day. The question before us, therefore, is how we can "baptize" Mothers' day so that it can reflect core gospel values. Third thoughts: first, by a happy coincidence this Sunday is

also Good Shepherd Sunday since the Gospel reading is taken from John 10. We can recognize all those mothers who serve as parents, teachers, catechists, liturgical ministers, etc. who truly "shepherd" the Church. Second, as Catholics we can use this Mothers' Day as the opportunity to renew our devotion to Mary, the Blessed Mother. May her example and prayers continue to guide the Church. Third, let us pray for our mothers, living and deceased, who were the instruments of God's gift of life.




