



AUGUST 4, 2019 18TH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

ON THE WAY.....



May the grace and peace of the Holy Spirit be with us forever.

The Old Testament book of Ecclesiastes professes a rather unusual vision of what it means to live a godly life. The author's view is almost cynical. "Vanity of vanities! All things are vanity!" Since everyone dies anyway, what's the use, seems to be the attitude. The book is part of the "wisdom" tradition of Israel and is traditionally ascribed to King Solomon. Modern Scholars doubt that authorship and instead call the author by the name he gives himself, Qoheleth, meaning "the one who addresses the assembly." The presence of Persian loan words which were introduced into the Hebrew language at the time of the exile suggest that it could not have been written before the year 500 B.C., long after Solomon. The presence of Ecclesiastes in the Bible is something of a puzzle, as the common themes of the Hebrew scriptures —a God who reveals and redeems, who elects and cares for a chosen people—are absent from it. Ecclesiastes is the most extreme example of a tradition of skepticism and no other example of skepticism matches Ecclesiastes for a sustained denial of faith and doubt in the goodness of God. The conclusion of the book: "Fear God, and keep his commandments; for that is the whole duty of everyone" (12:13) strikes some scholars as a late addition to make the book more palatable.

One way of reading the book is as the record of Qoheleth's quest for knowledge: opposing judgments (e.g., "the dead are better off than the living" (4:2) vs. "a living dog is better off than a dead lion" (9:4)) are therefore provisional, and it is only at the conclusion that the verdict is delivered (11–12:7). On this reading, Qoheleth's sayings are goads, designed to provoke dialogue and reflection in his readers, rather than to reach premature and self-assured conclusions. The subjects of Ecclesiastes are the pain and frustration engendered by observing the distortions and inequities pervading the world, the uselessness of human deeds, and the limitations of wisdom and righteousness. The phrase "under the sun" appears thirty times in connection with these observations; all this coexists with a firm belief in God, whose power, justice and unpredictability are sovereign. History and nature move in cycles, so that all events are predetermined and unchangeable, and life has no meaning or purpose: the wise man and the man who does not study wisdom will both die and be forgotten: man should be reverent ("Fear God"), but in this life it is best to simply enjoy God's gifts.

In the 60's there was a popular song (written by Pete Seegar and popularized by the Byrds) entitled "Turn, Turn, Turn" based on Ecclesiastes 3. "There is a time for every purpose under heaven," becomes the refrain. The song adds to the phrase "a time of war, a time of peace" the non-Biblical phrase "I swear it's not too late." The pessimistic tone of the text takes on a more positive tone with that addition. All of which says to us that in reading the Bible we can recognize the broad spectrum of belief that have characterized the people of God over the centuries ... and characterizes us today.


