ON THE WAY.....

May the grace and peace of the Holy Spirit be with us forever.

Labor Day provides an opportunity for a reflection on the long tradition of the Church's teaching about the value of labor and the importance of labor unions.

Pope Leo XIII in his encyclical: Of New Things (Rerum Novarum), 1891:The most important of all [workplace associations and organizations] are workingmen's unions. . . . Such unions should be suited to the requirements of this our age - an age of wider education, of different habits, and of far more numerous requirements in daily life. It is gratifying to know that there are actually in existence not a few associations of this nature, consisting either of workmen alone, or of workmen and employers together, but it were greatly to be desired that they should become more numerous and more efficient. (no. 49)

Pope John Paul II in his encyclical: On Human Work (Laborem Excercens), 1981: All these rights [of workers], together with the need for the workers themselves to secure them, give rise to yet another right: the right of association, that is to form associations for the purpose of defending the vital interests of those employed in the various professions. These associations are called labor or trade unions. . . . Their task is to defend the existential interests of workers in all sectors in which their rights are concerned. The experience of history teaches that organizations of this type are an indispensable element of social life, especially in modern industrialized societies. (no. 20)

Pope Benedict XVI in his encyclical: Charity in Truth (Caritas in Veritate), 2009: Through the combination of social and economic change, trade union organizations experience greater difficulty in carrying out their task of representing the interests of workers, partly because Governments, for reasons of economic utility, often limit the freedom or the negotiating capacity of labor unions. . . . The repeated calls issued within the Church's social doctrine ... must therefore be honored today even more than in the past, as a prompt and far-sighted response to the urgent need for new forms of cooperation at the international level, as well as the local level. (no. 25)

Unites States Catholic Bishops: Economic Justice for All, 1986: No one may deny the right to organize without attacking human dignity itself. Therefore, we firmly oppose organized efforts, such as those regrettably now seen in this country, to break existing unions and prevent workers from organizing. (no. 104)) It is unfair to expect unions to make concessions if managers and shareholders do not make at least equal sacrifices. (no. 106) Perhaps the greatest challenge facing U.S. workers and unions today is that of developing a new vision of their role in the U.S. economy of the future. The labor movement in the United States stands at a crucial moment. The dynamism of the unions that led to their rapid growth in the middle decades of this century has been replaced by a decrease in the percentage of U.S. workers who are organized. American workers are under heavy pressures today that threaten their jobs. . . . In these difficult circumstances, guaranteeing the rights of U.S. workers calls for imaginative vision and creative new steps, not reactive or simply defensive strategies. (no. 108).


