

ON THE WAY.....



May the grace and peace of the Holy Spirit be with us forever.

Today is the National Day of Prayer for the African-American Family (as we begin Black History Month), the World Day for Consecrated Life, Groundhog Day, World Wetlands Day (which aims to raise global awareness about the vital role of wetlands for people and planet), and Super Bowl Sunday. With all of that going on we should not overlook that today we celebrate the Feast of the Presentation of the Lord. Forty days ago we rejoiced in the Nativity of the Lord. Today we celebrate that day when Mary and Joseph, fulfilled the Law of Moses. "A woman who becomes pregnant and gives birth to a son will be ceremonially unclean for seven days, just as she is unclean during her monthly period. On the eighth day the boy is to be circumcised. Then the woman must wait thirty-three days to be purified from her bleeding. She must not touch anything sacred or go to the sanctuary until the days of her purification are over. When the days of her purification for a son or daughter are over, she is to bring to the priest a lamb or two doves or two young pigeons, one for a burnt offering and the other for a sin offering. In this way the priest will make atonement for her, and she will be clean" (Leviticus 12:2-4,8).

Just to make things more complicated, this date has also been known as Candlemas. When Simeon who was in the temple when the Holy Family arrived blessed the infant Jesus he prayed thus: "With my own eyes I have seen the salvation which you have prepared in the sight of every people: a light to reveal you to the nations and the glory of your people Israel." The Church has picked up on that prayer and uses the day of the Presentation to bring candles to the church where they are blessed and then used for the rest of the year. These blessed candles serve as a symbol of Jesus Christ, who is the Light of the World. Technically, in the Roman Rite, the liturgical end of Christmas is the Baptism of Our Lord. Many take down the Christmas decorations on that day, though some take them down on Epiphany. However, there is also a tradition in some areas that defines Candlemas as a Christmas feast, so some argue that Candlemas is the end of the Christmas cycle. The Vatican takes down the Christmas greenery on the Baptism of Our Lord, but leaves the Nativity crèche up until Candlemas. This may be an attempt to make a compromise between these varying traditions.


One no longer practiced tradition to mention: long time Catholics might remember the custom of "churching" a mother. In imitation of Mary's purification, mothers would come to Church to be blessed after the birth of child. There was a beautiful prayer as part of the ceremony that concluded:

"by the merits and intercession of the same blessed Mary, she may merit to arrive, together with her offspring, at the joys of everlasting happiness. Amen."

LENTEN OPPORTUNITY



Do you want to address I racism in your community, but MINISTRIES you don't know where to begin?

Do you long for a space to ask hard questions about race and privilege? Do you want to learn how to advocate for racial equity within your family, church and community?

The St. James Evangelization Committee is offering the JustFaith Ministries' "Faith and Racial Equity: Exploring Power and Privilege" program during Lent. This is an eight-week module in their Just Matters series that awakens individuals and groups to racial injustices within our political and economic systems that empower some and oppress others. It includes grounding in Scripture, conversation on specific issues related to power and privilege, wisdom from community advocates, and tools to discern action steps to combat racism.

Beginning with an all-day retreat on February 22, the program will continue on Tuesday evenings from March 3 through April 21. Sessions will be held in the rectory from 6:30 to 8:30 p.m. Registration will be limited to 15 participants, and a commitment to as much of the program as possible is required. There is a \$25 registration fee (financial assistance is available) to help cover retreat and program costs.
