## ON THE WAY.....



May the grace and peace of the Holy Spirit be with us

One of the exciting developments after Vatican Council II was the ecumenical movement. The common faith that all Christians share was seen as more important than the things that divide us. Commissions and committees were established on the national and international level to discover points of commonality. Agreements were reached which help to clarify doctrinal differences. On the local level pastoral associations were formed so that Churches in a particular area could speak with one voice about issues they shared. The Week of Prayer for Christian Unity was promoted to create an awareness on the part of the people in the pew of the need to work to overcome separation.

Much of that early enthusiasm about ecumenism has waned. It is not so much that the old hostilities between denominations has crept up again. It is more that each Church is dealing with its own issues so that internal problems seem more pressing than external relations. There is something wrong-headed in thinking this way since many of the problems we face as Catholics - for example, the fact that many young people are no longer attending Church – are shared by other faiths as well. We will be the richer by having relations with other Christians Churches.

These thoughts arise because yesterday completed this year's Week of Prayer for Christian Unity. The theme of the week was: "They Showed Us Unusual Kindness" (cf. Acts 28:2). The theme finds its origins in the Acts of the Apostles (Acts 27:18 - 28:10) where St. Paul reported on his experience in Malta after his shipwreck. This theme reflects the fact that gathering annually throughout the world to pray for the unity of Christians reminds us of the need for "unusual kindness" in the dialogue the leads to growth in unity. We do this in a world where separation and division hinder the quest for Christian Unity. In 2020, we are being called to show unusual kindness towards one another.

The key to ecumenism is dialogue. Dialogue first entered the Church's vocabulary as the method of approaching the modern world Pope Saint Paul VI promoted. This illustrates the spirit of the Second Vatican Council which challenged the Church's relations with other Christian bodies and religious communities. Thus, the Church committed itself irrevocably to building fruitful relationships with others: fostering bonds of friendship, mutual understanding, and constructive collaboration. Pope Francis puts it this way: "Dialogue is our method, not as a shrewd strategy but out of fidelity to the One who never wearies of visiting the marketplace, even at the eleventh hour, to propose his offer of love (Mt 20:1-16). The path ahead, then, is dialogue among yourselves, dialogue in your presbyterates, dialogue with lay persons, dialogue with families, dialogue with society. I cannot ever tire of encouraging you to dialogue fearlessly." Certainly in the months ahead St. James will be in dialogue with some of our neighboring Catholic parishes as part of the Renew My Church process. This will be important and challenging to us. But given the fact that many of our relatives, friends, and neighbors are not Catholic we must find ways to dialogue with them as well.

## LENTEN OPPORTUNITY



Just Faith Do you want to address racism in your community, but MINISTRIES you don't know where to begin?

Do you long for a space to ask hard questions about race and privilege? Do you want to learn how to advocate for racial equity within your family, church and community?

The St. James Evangelization Committee is offering the JustFaith Ministries' "Faith and Racial Equity: Exploring Power and Privilege" program during Lent. This is an eight-week module in their Just Matters series that awakens individuals and groups to racial injustices within our political and economic systems that empower some and oppress others. It includes grounding in Scripture, conversation on specific issues related to power and privilege, wisdom from community advocates, and tools to discern action steps to combat racism.

Beginning with an all-day retreat on February 22, the program will continue on Tuesday evenings from March 3 through April 21. Sessions will be held in the rectory from 6:30 to 8:30 p.m. Registration will be limited to 15 participants, and a commitment to as much of the program as possible is required. There is a \$25 registration fee (financial assistance is available) to help cover retreat and program costs.
