

ON THE WAY.....



May the grace and peace of the Holy Spirit be with us forever.

Ubuntu: I am because we are and we are because I am.

The philosophy of Ubuntu was developed in South Africa during the time of the Truth and Reconciliation Commission, most particularly by Desmond Tutu. You can describe Ubuntu as the belief that a person is a person through other people. Humanity is not embedded in my person solely as an individual; my humanity is co-substantively bestowed upon the other and me. Humanity is a quality we owe to each other. We create each other. And if we belong to each other, we participate in our creations: we are because you are, and since you are, definitely I am. You can see how this philosophy could serve as the foundation of a new kind of society post-apartheid.

Ubuntu is also something we need in the United States right now. We have all retreated into our respective tribes and tend to demonize the "other." If they don't think like me they must be evil or unpatriotic or senseless. We must recover the common humanity that we possess which is deeper and stronger than race or culture or language or ethnicity. Our humanity will be stunted if we aren't open to recognizing the other as a valuable person.

Ubuntu has unknowingly been the philosophy which made St. James the place it is today. The generation of builders welcomed the generation of migrants from the south who welcomed those seeking a hospitable community who welcomed the students from local campuses. At each turn St. James became more "human," a better expression of our God-given nature. What a relief that I don't have to create myself but can instead join with others in finding my true identity.

This Heritage Sunday we are particularly attentive to the fact that St. James is what it is because of the gift of blackness that African-American Catholics have given to the Church. This gift shaped the parish and continues to serve as the bass chord of our being together. In 1989, Sister Thea Bowman, of happy memory, described some of the characteristics of being authentically black and authentically Catholic:

"Black spirituality demands not only that you believe and that you hope and that you love. It also demands that you witness and testify; it is participatory. It is having people say to me what God is for them and to share that faith in communion, in love. Black Spirituality is contemplative, to contemplate the living word in the silence of the midnight hour. Black Spirituality is communal. Black spirituality is joyful in the time of trouble. Black Spirituality is holistic. As we journey together in faith and hope and love, we got to hold onto one another. You got to believe in the essential goodness of all humanity. The

spiritual journey is the journey home. Everybody knows where home is, home is where you are loved. It's where you belong. We're journeying together toward the eternal city where there'll be no death but only life and love and eternal joy."
