ON THE WAY.....



May the grace and peace of the Holy Spirit be with us forever.

It takes a lot of nerve for the Church to call this period we are entering "ordinary time." What is ordinary about not being able to attend Mass as a community? About weeks of street demonstrations confronting the heritage of racism prevalent in our country? About massive unemployment due to an economy that has shut down? About politicians who are unable to look beyond their own interests and think of the common good – well, maybe that is ordinary.

Of course, in the Church ordinary time does not refer in its root to a time which is normal, usual, typical, regular. Rather, "ordinary" in the liturgical calendar is related to the English word "ordinal," an item in an ordered sequence. In other words, ordinary time means counted time. From now until Advent we count off the weeks – this is "twelfth Sunday in ordinary time" because there were some "ordinary" Sundays in between the Christmas season and Lent.

During the liturgical seasons of Advent/Christmas, Lent/Easter the readings assigned for a particular day are chosen with a specific theme in mind. In Ordinary Time we practice what is known as a "continuous reading" of the epistle and the gospel, going chapter by chapter through the books. (The Old Testament lesson is chosen because of a connection with the gospel.) For the next thirteen weeks the epistle will be taken from St. Paul's letter to the Romans. This is year A which means that the gospel is (usually) taken from St. Matthew.

The Gospel of Matthew is structured as a series of five sermons or discourses (modeled, perhaps, in imitation of the "five books of Moses" in the Hebrew Scriptures.) The first, longest and most famous of these sermons is called "on the mount," Jesus' description of the life of his disciples. The second sermon, found in chapter ten of the gospel, provides instructions to the Twelve Apostles and is sometimes called the Mission Discourse. This sermon/discourse is directed to the twelve apostles who are named in Matthew 10:2-3. In the discourse Jesus advises them how to travel from city to city, carry no belongings and to preach only to Israelite communities. He tells them to be wary of opposition, but have no fear for they will be told what to say to defend themselves when needed in the power of the Holy Spirit.

This Gospel passage is addressed – as all of the teachings of Jesus – not simply to that initial audience of the twelve apostles but to us as well. When Jesus says "Do not fear" he understands that there are some really potentially frightening things out there. We need not be afraid, according to the Lord, because this is God's world and God's love for us is unchanging. Let us place all of those things that are currently scaring us into the hands

of our Loving God and feel the divine embrace like that of a mother comforting her nightmare awakened child with the blessed assurance that it's okay, that "all will be well, all manner of things will be well."




