# ON THE WAY.....



May the grace and peace of the Holy Spirit be with us forever.

A recent panel from the comic strip “Pearls before Swine” starts with the pig expressing great happiness. When asked why he responded “I’ve been given six months to a year to focus on what’s important to me all the while spending more time with my loved ones.” The rat observed, “The guy even sees the bright side of a pandemic.” What about us, can we see the bright side of a pandemic?

I remember thinking when this first began that being in lockdown was going to give me a good opportunity to pray more. Since there weren’t going to be as many external things pulling at me I could construct my daily schedule in a way that had more time for God. Like all the good intentions (were you going to learn to play the guitar? Learn French? Become a quilter? during quarantine) mine did not work out as I intended. Five months into the pandemic I am pretty much stuck where I was before.

Contrast that with Jesus who built into his busy life time to pray: “Jesus went up on the mountain by himself to pray.” If the Son of God needed to have prayer in his life how much more do we need prayer. Let me suggest some of the characteristics of “mountain top” prayer like that of Jesus as described by the Trappist Monk, Thomas Merton, who died in 1968.

First, prayer is simple. Merton quotes one of the desert fathers, St. Macarius, about how to pray: “It is not necessary to use many words. Only stretch out your arms and say: Lord, have pity on me as you desire and as you well know how.” The first generation in the desert would make us simple phrases drawn from the scripture and throw them out “like javelins.” One popular prayer was “O God, come to my aid.” Pretty simple.

Second, our prayer is never really ours but part of a chorus of prayer that rises up from the praising community, the people of God. As members of the people of God we know ourselves as redeemed sinners. Our prayer should always open us up to receive God’s mercy. We are not attempting to achieve anything in prayer except that we become “like children” who are given gifts not because we deserve them but simply because God loves to give them.

Prayer of this sort is an attentive, watchful listening of the heart. There is the prayer of jubilation that we raise up particularly in the liturgy but on the mountaintop, or in the quiet of our room, we enter into silence so that God can address us. In this kind of prayer we trust that God is more intimate to us than we are to ourselves, as St. Augustine put it.

Finally, we should remember that prayer, like any exercise, is something that we need to work at. Just as we can’t do a two minute plank the first time we try, we will develop our “listening heart” only after keeping at it with regularity. There is no “been there, done that” with prayer. Prayer is the work of a lifetime.
