### ON THE WAY.....



May the grace and peace of the Holy Spirit be with us forever.

The Sunday readings are on a three year cycle so that we can be exposed to more of the Bible. This year (called Year C) the gospel readings will be taken (mostly) from St. Luke. In all likelihood St. Luke was familiar with St. Mark's gospel since the third gospel follows the same chronology as the second. In addition, he seems to have had some material in common with St. Matthew that St. Mark was not familiar with. Scholars speculate there was a source (which they call Q after the German word for "source") which both Luke and Matthew drew upon in writing their gospels. St. Luke also had some material which only he utilized – for example, the infancy narrative with angels and shepherds is only found in Luke. The major difference between Luke and the other Gospel writers (the evangelists) is that he wrote a second volume called the Acts of the Apostles. It seems that Luke was eager to demonstrate continuity between the earthly ministry of Jesus and the life of the first generation of believers. His two books together constitute over 25% of the New Testament.

Luke was an educated Greek speaker who was comfortable using the linguistic techniques common to his time. He knew the Jewish Scriptures in a Greek Translation but was not an eyewitness to the ministry of Jesus. As he acknowledges in the pre-amble to his gospel he "carefully investigated" the reports from those who witnessed the events he relates in the gospel "to write an orderly account" (Luke 1:1-4). There is some evidence that Luke was not raised a Jew but was, perhaps, a convert to Judaism before he became a Christian. He was not a native of Palestine so some of the geographic details get a little fuzzy. The most likely date for the composition of the gospel would be around 85AD. The way the third gospel talks about the fate of Jerusalem makes it seem likely that the city had already been destroyed by the time the gospel was written.

In the Acts of the Apostles Luke describes himself as a companion of St. Paul on some of his missionary journeys. There are passages where the narrator switches from reporting what "they" did to recounting what "we" did. One interesting aspect of the relationship of Luke and Paul can be found in the title of apostle. In his own writings Paul insists on the title apostle for himself. Even though he did not walk the dusty roads of Galilee with Jesus he claims his experience on the Damascus road he felt gave him the authority of an apostle. Luke wants to keep the title "apostle" limited to the twelve chosen by Jesus. This is for theological reasons relating to his view of history. For Luke once Judas is replaced by Matthias (as related in the Acts of the Apostles) the "college" of apostles was completed. This demonstrated that the followers of Jesus are the "new Israel" where the twelve tribes of the Chosen People are given further expression in the twelve apostles. Luke's gospel is lyrical, compassionate,

prayerful – just what we need this year!




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

## Saint of the Week

One of the most famous members of the Dominican Order, St. Thomas Aquinas (1225 - 1274) is well-known by many for his theological work, "The Summa Theologiae." Born in Italy, his mother wanted him to become a Benedictine and had high hopes that he would eventually become abbot of Monte Cassino, where he spent much of his youth. To change his vocation, she had him kidnapped by his brothers on his way to Paris at the age of 19. He spent two years in their captivity. Despite this, nothing could shake him from his vocation to become a Dominican priest and he was eventually released. Once free, he went to Paris and then to Cologne, where he finished his studies with Albert the Great.

His greatest contribution to the Catholic Church is his writings. The unity, harmony, and continuity of faith and reason, of revealed and natural human knowledge, encompasses his writings. The Summa Theologiae, his last and, unfortunately, uncompleted work, deals with the whole of Catholic theology.

The patron saint of teachers, theologians and students, St. Thomas Aquinas died in 1274. His life and the impact he had on the whole Church, however, remains alive today.
