



ON THE WAY.....



May the grace and peace of the Holy Spirit be with us forever.

Patron saints are part of the tradition in Catholicism. The idea is a simple one: we've got a friend in high places. Some cities received their patron because their founding was associated with a particular saint, like San Francisco or San Juan (Saints Francis and John, respectively.) In a particular diocese churches have patron to serve as their heavenly model and guide. St. James was a particular favorite in Chicago with, at one time, seven different parishes named after him. Professions will have patrons. For example, since he was a working man, St. Joseph is the patron saint of workers. St. Matthew, given his profession, is logically the patron saint of accountants. St. Veronica is the patron saint of photographers because the image of Christ appeared on her veil. Sometimes a patronage can almost seem ironic. St. Rene Goupil is the patron saint of anesthesiologists because at his martyrdom he was knocked out by a tomahawk. During the long history of the church certain events suggested a patron – St. Christopher is the patron saint of travelers because of story that he helped to carry the Christ child. (He has been removed from the Church's calendar because there is no physical evidence he actually lived.) Illnesses and diseases have patrons one can turn to in times of distress. St. Lucy in the patron said of eye diseases and St. Agatha is the patron of those with breast cancer since at their martyrdoms those body parts were targeted by their torturers. St. Blasé is patron for those with diseases of the throat since he once helped a boy choking on a fish bone. How St. Anthony became the patron saint of finding lost things is an interesting story. One of the friars had taken his prayer book and when he prayed about it the miscreant felt bad and returned it. One of my favorites is St. Expeditus who is invoked against procrastination – although it might be that his name suggested that patronage.

Saint James is known in Spanish as Santiago and he's the patron saint of Spain, Guatemala, Nicaragua and of fishermen, since he was a fisherman himself. He became patron of Spain because, according to the legend he started his preaching in the northern Spanish region of Galicia. In the year 40 AD, the Virgin Mary appeared to each of the Apostles of Christ in turn to warn them of her impending death. James took the perilous journey back to Jerusalem to pay his respects but was captured and executed by beheading by King Herod Agrippa I in the year 44 AD. Although he died in Jerusalem, his remains were brought back to his beloved Galicia and a church erected above them. This was the beginnings of the cathedral of Santiago de Compostela and the body of St. James is said to be buried there to this day and it became a place of pilgrimage (the camino). When the Christians started the re-conquest of Spain from the Moors they invoked the memory of St. James as the heavenly guarantor of victory. On the pilgrimage road to his burial place there are many statues of St. James astride a horse with sword in hand.

Maybe here in Chicago we can better imitate his more humble working class origins! St. James, pray for us.



Saint of the Week

Saint James the Apostle is also called James, son of Zebedee, or James the Greater to distinguish him from the other James in Jesus' group of twelve. Most of what we know about Saint James is recorded in the New Testament. He and his brother John were collected by Jesus along the sea of Galilee. Matthew 4:18-22 tells the story of Jesus calling first Simon Peter and his brother Andrew and then the sons of Zebedee. In Mark 3:17 the brothers receive a nickname from Jesus who calls them "sons of thunder" because of their many extreme reactions, like that in Luke 9:54 when they offer to call down fire on a Samaritan village. Saint James was part of Jesus' intimate circle, a witness to the Transfiguration, the resurrection of Jarius' daughter, and the agony in the garden of Gethsemane. In A.D. 44 Herod Agrippa had "James, the brother of John, killed by the sword." (Acts 12:2) He is the only apostle whose martyrdom is written of in the New Testament.

According to Spanish tradition, his body was taken to Santiago de Compostela, Spain where his relics were rediscovered in 9th century. This tradition has sometimes been attributed to a passage in the Song of Roland which tells of St. James appearing to Charlemagne in a dream, prophesying that Charlemagne would conquer the Moors in Spain. This was followed by a vision of stars which if followed would lead to the saint's lost tomb. In the Middle Ages Compostela was a hugely popular pilgrimage site. The saint's relics continue to rest in the cathedral there and one can still undertake the pilgrimage.
