

### ON THE WAY.....



May the grace and peace of the Holy Spirit be with us forever.


One of my theological heroes is Dietrich Bonhoeffer, a Lutheran pastor imprisoned and then killed by the Nazis in the waning days of World War II. He writes about what he calls "this-worldliness," which is his term for taking the Incarnation of Jesus with utmost seriousness. If the Son of God chose to live a human life then it is in the arena of human life where we will find God. He was deeply suspicious of wrapping oneself in religion as a refuge from living courageously in this world. While he was in prison he wrote many letters to family and friends that have been collected. One in particular caught my attention.

Bonhoeffer wrote: "I remember a conversation that I had in America thirteen years ago with a young French pastor We were asking ourselves quite simply what we wanted to do with our lives. He said he would like to become a saint (and I think it's quite likely that he did become one). At the time I was very impressed, but I disagreed with him, and said, in effect, that I should like to learn to have faith. For a long time I didn't realize the depth of the contrast. I thought I could acquire faith by trying to live a holy life, or something like it. I discovered later, and I'm still discovering right up to this moment, that it is only by living completely in this world that one learns to have faith. One must completely abandon any attempt to make something of oneself, whether it be a saint, or a converted sinner, or a churchman, a righteous man or an unrighteous one, a sick man or a health one. By this-worldliness I mean living unreservedly in life's duties, problems, successes and failures, experiences and perplexities. In so doing we throw ourselves completely into the arms of God, taking seriously not our own sufferings but those of God in the world – watching with Christ in Gethsemane."

We naturally tend to notice our own suffering but Bonhoeffer challenges those who are followers of Jesus to think of the "sufferings of God in the world." To name just a few of those sufferings: war in Ukraine and Sudan, the lingering effects of racism, a generation which has turned to guns and violence due to a lack of hope, economic disparity where the richest country on earth can't feed its children or house its families, a health care system tilted toward those who can afford it, people who are coping with the harm produced by abuse, an unwillingness to welcome those seeking asylum. I could go on and you could add your own. While these sufferings are much bigger than anything we at St. James can fix, Pastor Bonhoeffer dares us to bring these and other sufferings into our lives of faith. It is not sufficient to simply wring our hands and moan "isn't it terrible." We can't do everything but we can do something. Just as Jesus embraced the troubled humanity of his time so we must do. As we think about the future of St. James we invite the whole world – good, bad and ugly – into our mission.
