

ON THE WAY....



May the grace and peace of the Holy Spirit be with us forever.

Up until recently most Catholics were not great Bible readers. To get into the Bible as the Word of God requires some work on our part. It is, of course, an old book with parts of it going back almost four thousand years. The world was a much different place then. There were not, of course, computers or TVs or internet or airplanes or even light bulbs. The basic difference was that the ancient world was basically agrarian and the modern world is industrial. You see this in the parables of Jesus was refer to farms and not factories. To understand the Bible, therefore, requires that we make some mental adjustments as we enter into the mind of the authors. Some differences between the ancient world and ours:


- 90% of the population in Biblical times was rural and in today's world 90% is urban.
- Only 4.9% of the US population is involved in farming.
- In ancient times 3% of the population was literate. Today 3% are not literate. As a result oral traditions were the means of conveying information.
- Life expectancy was about forty years if you survived the dangers of childhood diseases.
- Almost half of all families lost one or both parents during the childbearing years.
- People married young.
- Violence was endemic. Of the 79 Roman emperors 41 were killed or deposed by force.
- Travel was difficult and time-consuming with the speed of a horse the upper limit.
- Most people never left their homeland or even their town.
- Change was slow. As a result the "generation gap" was not much of an issue.

These differences are characteristic of the entire Bible. There are certain specific dimensions of the social world of the Gospel writers that demand particular attention. Given the world in which they were writing when we read the gospels it helps to be aware of some presuppositions that the authors possessed.

- 1. The focus of each Gospel is the 'in-group.' The target audience of the written gospels would have known the stories and responded to them.
- The Gospel writers wrote for a specific audience at a specific time. Seeing the context in which they were written helps us to understand the text.
- 3. While we today look on the gospels as the primary means of evangelization the gospel writers themselves wanted to reinforce the faith of their already believing readers. Thus, for example, St. Luke stresses the presence of the Holy Spirit in his gospel because his community needed that message.
- 4. The gospel writers tell the story of Jesus in the framework of Israelite politics and not as theological documents which reflect the nature of God.
- 5. The gospels are designed to help people make sense of what they were going through. The times were chaotic and people were looking for something on which to anchor themselves. If we find our equilibrium thrown off by the times we live and turn to gospels for answers we are going to the right place!

Saturday, April 5th 9:30AM - 3PM St. James Church




