

ON THE WAY....



May the grace and peace of the Holy Spirit be with us forever.

Palm Sunday inaugurates Holy Week by taking us on a roller coaster. We begin the service with the triumphal procession in imitation of the experience of Jesus entering Jerusalem. The waving of the palms, the singing of the hymns, the movement of the entire community signifies the royal entrance of Jesus into the Holy City. But as the Palm Sunday service continues the mood shifts with the proclamation of the Passion. From a triumphal entry we hear a story of suffering and death. Holy Week is shaped in such a way that the notes of triumph and tragedy whirl around each other. We enter into the week so that our own lives, also characterized by triumph and tragedy, will find their meaning and purpose in the life and example of Jesus. We know that Easter is coming, that God wins in the end. However, the liturgy demands that we go through the "valley of darkness" on our journey to the glory of Easter. We are called to unite our story with the story of Jesus in the events of Holy Week.

The Passion of Jesus as found in the Gospel of Luke is proclaimed this year. Each of the gospel writers highlights different aspects of the Jesus story. For example, in the story of the Agony in the Garden Jesus is not portrayed as being completely crushed, "sorrowful unto death" who collapses to the ground. Instead, he kneels and prays and is comforted by an angel, as if in answer to his prayer. During the arrest he heals the severed ear of the enemy, and late on the cross he prays that God forgives his enemies since "they know not what they do." The betrayal of Jesus by Peter is punctuated in St. Luke's gospel with a look, a tender glace of love which causes Peter's immediate remorse. During the trial scenes Jesus in Luke's gospel keeps his dignity in the face of hatred and opposition. Luke adds a scene to the account of Pilate sending Jesus to Herod as part of the trial. The sentence that Jesus was innocent is thus reinforced by the testimony of a known enemy of the first Christians. The third gospel includes Jesus comforting the "women of Jerusalem" even in the midst of his march toward execution. It is not his own sufferings that he is concerned about but what "they and their children" will shortly have to endure. The poignant scene of Jesus forgiving the "good thief" on the cross also shows he was not concentrating on his own sufferings but on what those around him were going through. Jesus' dying words on the cross are not the anguished cry of "My God, My God, why have you abandoned me" that we hear in Matthew and Mark but rather the message of completion, of a job well done. "Father, into your hands I commend my spirit."

As we go through the events of Holy Week this year we must bring our own stories into the story of Jesus. Our sufferings only find meaning in the larger picture of God's redemptive purpose. And, as St. Luke wants us to understand, Jesus shows us that suffering does not get the last word if we keep our faith in God's love for us no matter what.


